Who are you looking for?

John 20:11-16 ¹¹ but Mary stood outside the tomb crying. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb ¹² and saw two angels in white, seated where Jesus' body had been, one at the head and the other at the foot. ¹³ They asked her, "Woman, why are you crying?" "They have taken my Lord away," she said, "and I don't know where they have put him." ¹⁴ At this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not realize that it was Jesus. ¹⁵ "Woman," he said, "why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for?" Thinking he was the gardener, she said, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him." ¹⁶ Jesus said to her, "Mary." She turned toward him and cried out in Aramaic, "Rabboni!" (which means Teacher).

Things certainly are crazy right now. We are all pretty much stuck at home. People have been laid off from their jobs, leaving them wondering how to pay their bills. Some people are afraid of getting ill from this virus. We can't even attend church in person. This isn't how it is supposed to be. At this point we don't even know what's coming next. It is disheartening.

Things weren't as they were supposed to be for the disciples or for Mary in the John passage quoted above either. The disciples were stuck hiding in the upper room in fear for their own lives. In their minds, Jesus wasn't supposed to die. His death left them adrift, wondering what was next. They were also disheartened.

To make matters worse, Mary went to Jesus' grave and found it empty. This caused her to be even more distraught. "Why would someone take her Lord's body", she wanted to know from the person she thought was the gardener? But the "gardener" asked her a very important question, "Who is it you are looking for?"

Like Mary, it is important for us to consider who it is we are looking for. Are we even looking for anyone at all? God promised us he would never leave us nor forsake us (Hebrews 13:5). So how intently do we watch for him on a daily basis? In normal times, when we get up in the morning to prepare for our day, do we pray for God to act in our lives and then do we watch for him to do so? Or do we push through life on our own? When we go to school or work, do we look for God's protective hand when we are dealing with difficult people or situations? Do we trust him to be involved? Or do we just handle it? -- I will never leave you nor forsake you.

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At times like these, do we look for Jesus amidst the empty shelves of the grocery store? Do we look for Jesus amongst the unemployed? -- I will never leave you nor forsake you.

Mary thought she was on her own. She was looking for a dead teacher, but she found a risen Savior. We have that same Savior, a Savior who wants to help us and who is involved in our lives. It is important for us to trust him and look for him as he acts within our lives too, because he will never leave nor forsake us.

Below is an excerpt from C. S. Lewis's The Screwtape Letters which gets at the importance of sticking ['connecting' sic] with Church even, and especially, in a crisis.

My Dear Wormwood,

Plagues are a most effective weapon given to us by our father below. Normally, Christians are quite comfortable in receiving the dreaded sacraments and gathering in their prayers and other heinous Arts. But if you can stir up a hysteria by means of a plague so that they cut themselves off from our enemies gifts to them, the torment of isolation will drive them to despair and season them quite deliciously much to our delight.

Get them to forget about their usual practices of prayer, fasting and alms giving and encourage them to become gluttons, slanderers, and lose all regard for their neighbor thinking only about themselves and their immediate needs. Storing up treasures which we can send moth and rust to destroy further sweetening their torment.

If you can, help them to redefine their usual words like "church" and "fellowship" and "ministry" so that they feel comfortable cutting themselves off from our enemies care and they can be tempted all the more.

Yes, Wormwood, a plague is a tried and true method of taking their eyes off our enemy and getting them to worship their own bodies. A most desirable position for we tempters. Never let a good crisis go to waste!


LWML Cincinnati Zone - Mission in Motion Good Shepherd ● April 26, 2-4 p.m.





The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod LCMS Stewardship Ministry – April 2020

On the topic of stewardship, one of the most common questions a person might ask is *not* whether a Christian should give to their church. Everyone knows this. Of course, Christians should give to their church. The most common question: "How much should I give?" But what they really mean is this: "Should Christians give a tithe of their income to their local congregation?" So, let's look at why you should or should not tithe.

Following are some reasons often offered for why Christians shouldn't give a tithe to their church.

Some say you shouldn't tithe because it isn't expressly commanded in the New Testament. Lacking that command, there is no "Thus saith the Lord" and no "should" for giving a tithe to your congregation.

Others say that Christians give to their congregation in ways much broader than money. They give of their time and their talents, and these, together with treasures (money), add up to more than a tithe.

Still others say they give of their treasures to other things besides their congregation, and they want to support those things alongside their church.

And there are those who think Christians shouldn't tithe because of fear. If they tithe, they are afraid their gift will be misused, and they are afraid they won't have enough to get the things they use, want, or need.

Following are some reasons for why Christians *should* give a tithe to their church.

Even though the New Testament doesn't specifically command Christians to give a tithe, the Old Testament people were commanded to tithe and did. On top of this, St. Paul often describes the giving Christians are to do in similar terms as a tithe: a regular and generous proportion of the first fruits of their income (1 Cor. 6:1–2; 2 Cor. 8:7–23; 2 Cor. 9:2–7).

But here's another way to think about it. What was the point of the tithe in the Old Testament? Where did it go? The reason for the Old Testament tithe was to support the full ministry of the Levites. They were not given any land because they had no time to farm; their full-time job was the ministry.

What does it say in the New Testament? "The Lord has commanded that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14). This is the verse that Luther put in the *Small Catechism*'s Table of Duties to cover what Christians owe to the support of the ministry.

It seems clear from both the Old and the New Testaments that the tithe is the goal of Christians in their giving. But what if we're not there yet? How should we handle this? What are we to do?

Let's answer this by asking a different question about something entirely different. What would you say to your adult children who only attended church quarterly or once a month? There, is after all, no passage in the New Testament that requires Christians to go to church weekly. Hebrews 10:25 is the closest we have, and it states simply for Christians to not neglect gathering together. Even though there is no passage that commands Christians to gather weekly, that is the implicit expectation throughout the Old and New Testaments. It is the goal.

So, what would you say to that son or daughter? I'd expect that conversation would be something like this: "I'm glad you're still going to church. It is a wonderful blessing to hear God's promises of forgiveness, life, and salvation, and to receive His gifts in the Word and the Sacraments. But you can do better, and it will only be a blessing to you. There is a better way, and I'd really like you to try to attain it."

This same conversation is how we should approach the topic of the tithe. It's not specifically commanded in the New Testament, but it sure seems like the implicit expectation of both the Old and New Testaments. So, the church is ecstatic that you're giving when you're giving in all these ways – time, talents, and treasures.

Encouraging Word
