#### The Gift of the Holy Spirit

**Romans 5:1-5** is a beautiful section of scripture that lists some of the gifts we have received as Christians because of our justification by faith in Christ Jesus. Paul starts by saying, "Therefore, since we have been justified by faith..."

This phrase states what makes a person a Christian. We are justified by faith in Jesus Christ. 1 Peter 1:9 takes this a little further by declaring that this means we are "obtaining the outcome of our faith, the salvation of our souls." All true Christians believe in and rely on this truth, and this common belief is what makes all believers in Jesus brothers and sisters in Christ, regardless of the denomination to which they belong.

Paul, in Romans 5, also uses this opportunity to describe what this means to us: "Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have..." <sup>1</sup> Peace with God, <sup>2</sup> Access by faith, <sup>3</sup> Rejoicing in hope of the glory of God, <sup>3</sup> Rejoicing in our sufferings, <sup>5</sup> God's love, and <sup>5</sup> **The** 

Holy Spirit who has been given to us.

All of these things have been given to us through our faith in Christ Jesus. Even the Holy Spirit who was promised to us by Jesus himself:

**John 14:16-17** <sup>16</sup> And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Helper, to be with you forever, <sup>17</sup> even the Spirit of truth...

We could have a big debate over when we received the Holy Spirit. Was it at our physical baptism as infants? Was it at the point in our lives as children or adults when we came to believe in Jesus? There are adults who have never been physically baptized who have come to faith in Jesus for their salvation. The Holy Spirit is working in their lives. The great commission is for us to reach out to and share the Gospel with nonbelievers so they too may come to faith.

The publication, THE THEOLOGY AND PRACTICE OF HOLY BAPTISM | ADDENDUM: OTHER QUESTIONS ABOUT BAPTISM on Page 26, question 4 puts it this way:

With regard to when God creates faith, we might revisit Jesus' conversation with

Nicodemus regarding our new birth by the Holy Spirit. There Jesus states, "The wind blows where it wishes, and you hear its sound, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit" (John 3:8). Picking up on this verse, the Augsburg Confession notes that the Holy Spirit creates faith "where and when it pleases God in those who hear the gospel." That would include Baptism, where God has connected His Gospel Word to water (AC V 3; KW 41).

"The Holy Spirit creates faith "where and when it pleases God in those who hear the gospel."" This may include physical baptism of the infant where the Gospel is preached or it may not. It may include situations in which a person shares the gospel with a child or an adult friend or it may not. It may include when a person hears the Word of God in a sermon at church or through a radio program or it may not. Where or when a person receives or responds to the Holy Spirit and expresses faith in God is a mystery to us. It happens "where and when it pleases God."

What we do know is that, as Christians, we have the Holy Spirit now. We are not to wonder whether or not we have received the Spirit or waste our time arguing over when he came to us. **1 Corinthians 3:16** bluntly states, "Don't you know that you yourselves are God's temple and that God's Spirit lives in you?"

And because we have the Holy Spirit, we are called to live and walk according to the Spirit and set our minds on the things of the Spirit:

Romans 8:5-6 <sup>5</sup> For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. <sup>6</sup> To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace.


**Galatians 5:16** <sup>16</sup> But I say, walk by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh.

Because we have faith in Jesus, the Holy Spirit lives within us. It is not a feeling; it is a fact. We must honor that fact by allowing the Holy Spirit to help us change our mindset with respect to how we live our lives and how we respond to temptations, frustrations, anxiety. We must walk in the way of the Spirit as outlined in **Galatians 5**. We must also be prepared to give an answer to those who want to know the reason for the joy and hope we have. We can do this by sharing with others how God has worked in our lives and why we put our faith in Jesus. Then prayerfully, God will direct the Holy Spirit to work in those people's lives to create faith for their justification, "where and when it pleases God."

Lent begins this month with Ash Wednesday. It is a somber time in the church marked in varying degrees by fasting and sacrifice as we look to repent and mourn our sinful condition which nailed our Savior to the cross. And how do we respond to that? By giving up chocolate? Really?

I'd like to suggest a bit more rigor - reflection, confession, turning, risk taking and real change. Now is the opportune time change up the diet, confess and sacrifice those behaviors, bad habits and failings that plague us and keep us from a healthy life style - Christ-like living. Consider this diet change:

Instead of feasting on gossip, how about giving it up for a good helping of edifying and encouragement? Instead of feasting on envy, how about giving it up for a good helping of contentment and gratitude? Instead of feasting on worry, how about giving it up for a good helping of faith and trust? Instead of feasting on resentment, how about giving it up for a good helping of forgiveness and compassion? Instead of feasting on assumption, how about getting the facts straight up and directly? (I learned this lesson just last month through council, so it's fresh on my mind!)

You get the idea and I hope you get fat on all the good stuff during Lent! I guarantee you will lose weight - the weight of the world and your sin - and gain a lightness in your step with a Savior who walks alongside ready to join you at His feast table.





Your Council got busy again in January after taking December off.

Now that our constitution and bylaws are approved, you can expect to see that topic on the agenda for the voter meeting coming this month - February 21. The agenda will include discussion on how to best move into the new structure through the election process and where we are with our financial status and call committee.

The results of the congregational voting are in regarding the LCMS Synod Convention Referendum question: Shall the Synod add a year to the current 2019–2022 triennium, allowing districts to hold their conventions in either 2021 or 2022, and moving the upcoming national Synod Convention from 2022 to 2023? [Thereafter, the triennium cycle will continue forward from 2023 in three-year increments, as before (i.e., with district conventions held in 2025, 2028, etc., and Synod Conventions held in 2026, 2029, etc.).] Twenty-two unique voters participated (15 is a quorum for a vote) on or before January 22 as requested and voted unanimously 'Yes' to the question. This result has been captured in a spreadsheet for the record and our vote has been cast at the site designated by the Synod.

The boards have been active on your behalf. Property has worked with American Heritage Boys and they will be joining the American Heritage Girls using the FLC on opposite Monday's beginning sometime in February. And have you noticed our sign! The lights are bright once again! Please thank Rob Nielsen when you see him! Inreach and the Care Team continue their service to our members and the stewardship board continues researching how to move our pledging and time/talent commitments to an online format, making it more convenient.

Midweek of Lent 3 3/10/2021The Garden of Gethsemane: Jesus is betrayed and arrested in this garden under cover

of darkness.

Midweek of Lent 4 3/17/2021The Courtyard: While Jesus is put on trial before the high priest, Peter denies Jesus in

this place.

Midweek of Lent 5 3/24/2021 Pilate's Judgment Hall: Pilate is positioned here to set Jesus free, but turns him over to

be crucified instead.

Good Friday 4/2/2021 Easter 4/4/2021

We are looking forward to the Easter joy on April 4. This is a new year. Last year we were only able to have a service for Easter on Zoom and not in the church. How blessed are we to enjoy a worship service together this year.
