#### A Prophet Like Me

During the Christmas Eve morning service, we read the passage from Deuteronomy 18:15 in which Moses said, "The LORD your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own brothers. You must listen to him." Many years later, the Pharisees asked John the Baptist whether he was that prophet. Hearing these passages on Christmas Eve made me ponder what Moses meant when he said the prophet would be "like me" and how is Jesus that prophet like Moses. Consider the following:

• Moses led the people of Israel out of slavery. Micah 6:4 states that, "4 I brought you up out of Egypt and redeemed you from the land of slavery. I sent Moses to lead you..."

Jesus also freed us from our bondage, our bondage to sin. Romans 6:22-23 describes it like this: <sup>22</sup> But now that

you have been set free from sin and have become slaves to God, the benefit you reap leads to holiness, and the result is eternal life. <sup>23</sup> For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

 Moses spoke to God face to face. Exodus 33:11 says, "11 The LORD would speak to Moses face to face, as a man speaks with his friend."

Likewise, Matthew 11:27 describes Jesus' as having a close relationship with His Father: <sup>27</sup> "All things have been committed to me by my Father. No one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and those to whom the Son chooses to reveal him.


- Moses is described in Deuteronomy 34:11 as having performed "all those miraculous signs and wonders the LORD sent him to do in Egypt."
  - Jesus performed many more miracles, the most incredible being his resurrection from the dead.
- Moses interceded for the people with God as told in Exodus 32:9-12, 14: <sup>9</sup> "I have seen these people," the LORD said to Moses, "and they are a stiff-necked people. <sup>10</sup> Now leave me alone so that my anger may burn against them and that I may destroy them. Then I will make you into a great nation." <sup>11</sup> But Moses sought the favor of the LORD his God. "O LORD," he said, "why should your anger burn against your people, whom you brought out of Egypt with great power and a mighty hand? <sup>12</sup> Why should the Egyptians say, 'It was with evil intent that he brought them out, to kill them in the mountains and to wipe them off the face of the earth'? Turn from your fierce anger; relent and do not bring disaster on your people... <sup>14</sup> Then the LORD relented and did not bring on his people the disaster he had threatened.

In the same way, Jesus is our mediator and intercessor with God. 1 Timothy 2:5-6 says, "<sup>5</sup> For there is one God and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, <sup>6</sup> who gave himself as a ransom for all men..." Jesus is the prophet like Moses that God raised up for us. Moses' actions pointed to our savior in so many ways. That is also why Jesus was able to say in John 5:46, "If you believed Moses, you would believe me, for he wrote about me." Because Jesus is the prophet, let us believe him and listen to him just as Moses instructed us to do.
