Voter News

First the good news.... We had one of our largest attendance counts, 36! for a voter assembly. Thank you to all who participated in this important work of the church. The big news came from elders with the announcement that we have been blessed by the Lord of the Church with a full-time vacancy pastor willing to also take on shut-in visitation, confirmation and adult Bible study!

The not so good news is our financials. We have lost the momentum we had last fall, not sure why. It is extremely important that we continue to meet the revenue expectations of our budget so that we may be prepared for the future expenses expected around pastoral transition and the unexpected. For example, we are ready to begin the re-roofing and related repairs. We have funds on hand designated to that purpose. The hope is that unforeseen issues and/or damage are not discovered that may drain that fund with future items still on the hit list.

The conversation on the constitution and bylaw changes (dated 1-25-2020 in a prior distribution) was productive and constructive. The updates will be distributed with the goal of having a final reading and vote at the May voter assembly. The congregation will also receive the existing and proposed updated version of our Undesignated Funds Trigger Policy (newly named Operating Reserve Policy) that is intended to better clarify when and for what our operating reserves (emergency funds) may be used. Finally, as we begin our vacancy, take on the call process, seating of a call committee and congregation survey, it is all so important that we keep the counsel of **1 Corinthians 1:10** top of mind and heart. This is a time to come

together, learn about and from one another and all speak the same thing. Lent is a perfect time to reflect, pray, study, work out any conflicts and clear agendas, so that there are no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment. Practicing this discipline will better equip us to discern who we are as a family of God and whom He has chosen to lead us.

Praying without ceasing (1 Thes. 5:17) that we all are **perfectly joined together and in the same judgment** and serve as we are blessed for the kingdom work that is before us at Good Shepherd.


Meet Our Vice President

Devotion for Lent 2020



"Fix your eyes on Jesus."

When the people in the Passion narrative looked at Jesus, what did they see?

Eyes on Jesus asks us to look at Jesus through various Biblical character's viewpoints, learning how they saw Jesus. Did they misunderstand Him? Did they recognize Him as the Son of God?

Using Scripture passages from the Gospel of Mark, challenge yourself to consider what you see when you look at Jesus.

With devotions specifically made for children, the *Eyes on Jesus Calendar* helps children and families fix their eyes on Jesus throughout the Lenten season with Scripture readings, prayers, and questions that connect faith and life. Our Personal Seasons of Lent

There are times in our lives when nothing appears to be going our way. We can feel overwhelmed, alone, or forgotten by our families and friends and worse yet, by God himself. We pray, but hear no answer. We read God's word but are not encouraged. We are at a loss for what to do in our lives. These times can occur any time of

the year, any day, any hour. These times, whenever they occur, are our personal seasons of Lent.

Psalm 22 expresses the depth of our feelings when it proclaims in verses 1 and 2:

Psalm 22:1-2 ¹My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from saving me, from the words of my groaning? ²O my God, I cry by day, but you do not answer, and by night, but I find no rest.

There is no comfort for us in these words, just an expression of how we feel. And so, in our personal seasons of Lent, we are tempted to focus on our own pain. That is, until we realize that these are the same words our Lord spoke on the cross as he hung there abandoned by his Father, waiting to die for our sins. Then we know we are not alone. Our Lord Jesus went through the ultimate season of Lent.

"Yet", the psalmist declares in Psalm 22:3, "God is holy." It is clear from this statement that, despite what appears to be an unmerciful silence on God's part, the psalmist understands God is in charge. We remember the Garden of Gethsemane when Jesus prayed for the Father to take his cup from him, but also prayed, "Nevertheless, not my will, but yours be done." We pray earnestly for God to relieve us from our personal seasons of Lent. But we rarely pray for God's will to be done in our lives, even though we do not understand the outcomes.

Psalm 22:9 Yet you are he who took me from the womb; you made me trust you at my mother's breasts. ¹⁰ On you was I cast from my birth, and from my mother's womb, you have been my God.

God formed us and God created us. He knows what we need. In our personal seasons of Lent, because God is holy, we must remember to trust Him. Trusting God doesn't mean we cannot turn to Him in our time of need. Our trust in God means we can and should turn to Him, even if we don't immediately hear His voice. I love this section in Habakkuk:

Habakkuk 3:17-18 ¹⁷Though the fig tree does not bud and there are no grapes on the vines, though the olive crop fails and the fields produce no food, though there are no sheep in the pen and no cattle in the stalls, ¹⁸yet I will rejoice in the LORD, I will be joyful in God my Savior.

No matter how dismal life appears, in our personal seasons of Lent we are called to persevere in our trust in the Lord. This is shown by the psalmist as he continues to cry out to God in Psalm 22 verses 19 - 21:

Psalm 22: 19-21 ¹⁹But you, O LORD, do not be far off! O you my help, come quickly to my aid! ²⁰Deliver my soul from the sword, my precious life from the power of the dog! ²¹Save me from the mouth of the lion! You have rescued me from the horns of the wild oxen!

Our cries should not be cries of panic though. They should be cries of expectation that our God will hear us. He will deliver us. In our personal seasons of Lent, we are called to cry out to God.

In Psalm 22:21 the psalmist completes his sentence with the recognition that, in the midst of his cries, God has already rescued him. "You have rescued me...", he acknowledges. And we are already saved by God's grace and sanctified by him. This leads the psalmist and us to sing praises to God.

Psalm 22:22-24 ²²I will tell of your name to my brothers; in the midst of the congregation, I will praise you: ²³You who fear the LORD, praise him! All you offspring of Jacob, glorify him, and stand in awe of him, all you offspring of Israel! ²⁴For he has not despised or abhorred the affliction of the afflicted, and he has not hidden his face from him, but has heard, when he cried to him.

Just as God the Father did not abhor his son, but heard his cries and raised him from the dead, God has heard our cries. He has raised us up and seated us with Christ at the right hand of God. This should lead us to glorify God and tell of His name to others during our personal seasons of Lent.

As we mediate and worship during this Lenten season, let us remember how Jesus trusted his Father and persevered in his season of Lent. And let us persevere in our personal seasons of Lent by acknowledging that God is holy, by trusting him, by crying out to him, and by giving him the glory forever and ever. Amen

It is marked by calling sinners to repentance and setting them free to be everything the Lord has given them to be and do. God's ultimate goal for faithful stewards is to use their simple gifts in such a way that souls are rescued from death and given an eternal life that has a value and reward that is literally out of this world!

Prayer: Word of Life, You speak to us with a power and a tenderness that we can never fully appreciate or understand. It is sweet in our ears and sweeter as it is spoken with our lips and lives. Grant us the simple gift of faith, which seeks to share this treasure with those around us so that they may know this sweetness as well! **Amen**

Newsletter Article - March 2020

We are at the beginning of Lent. During the Lenten season, the church calls to our attention the sufficiency of what God gives. It points to the sufficiency of God's grace in the atoning work of Jesus. It shows us the sufficiency of faith in Jesus' work for us. It makes known the sufficiency of God's Word in faith and life.

But Lent doesn't just remind us of the sufficiency of God's spiritual gifts, the gifts that pertain to our redemption and salvation. Lent also reminds us of the sufficiency of the physical, temporal gifts of God, those that pertain to this body and life. In other words, it reminds us of the importance of godly contentment and of outward discipline and training of the body.

This outward training of the body teaches us not to give in to every desire of our flesh but to learn to say no to them. And it does this in such a way that if you fail, it is no sin. It is a way to practice without putting yourself into a compromising situation.

The easiest example of this is fasting. When you fast, you are practicing saying no to the desires of your body. But if you fail in this, if you break your fast, you have not sinned. You have, though, learned something about how your flesh works, how difficult it is to fight against it, and how you need help from above in order to do it.

There is another example of this. It is alms-giving. This is an increase in giving to the church and its mission during this time. We all know that our flesh finds security in money and stuff. By committing to give more to the church, you are training your flesh. You are, by this outward discipline, training yourself to be content with what God gives. You are practicing saying "no" to your desires. Again, if you fail, you have not sinned. But you've learned just how powerful your flesh is in leading you instead of you leading it. You've learned how you need help from above in being content with what God gives.

This is why St. Paul instructs young Pastor Timothy in this way:

"But godliness with contentment is great gain, for we brought nothing into the world, and[a] we cannot take anything out of the world. But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content. But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs." (1 Tim 6:6–10)

Our sufficiency is not of ourselves; it is in God. Let us learn this without sin by training our flesh this Lenten season.



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
