### Our Empty Way of Life

Psalm 107 begins with exclaiming, "Oh, give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever!" It then encourages the redeemed to participate in this rejoicing and gives four examples of life's troubles from which we may be delivered.

#### Verses 4-5 say,

Some wandered in desert wastes, finding no way to a city to dwell in; hungry and thirsty their soul fainted within them.

We tend to look for fulfillment in life from various sources, whether it be work, our kids, sex, drugs, sports, etc. But each are like deserts. They leave us empty. The Lord is the only true source of satisfaction. He is the only thing that can bring us meaning in life. When I retired, my status as a person of authority at work went away. Overnight I was nobody. But my relationship with God and our call to witness to others does not cease. It brings fulfillment above anything we can ever imagine.

#### Verses 10-11 say,

# Some sat in darkness and in the shadow of death, prisoners in affliction and in irons, for they had rebelled against the words of God, and spurned the counsel of the Most High.

Sometimes we flat out reject Jesus as our Lord; we would rather sit in the darkness of our own lives than live in the light of his life. Failure to turn to our Lord in prayer is like living in a house with the lights always off and never seeing or speaking to anyone. How lonely and empty a lack of prayer makes our lives.

#### Verses 17-18 say,

#### Some were fools through their sinful ways, and because of their iniquities suffered affliction; they loathed any kind of food and they drew near to the gates of death.

This occurs when we don't turn to God's word for our spiritual food. In fact, we loathe it as boring, taking too much time, or not important. We will always remain empty and will never come to know God better or understand his benefits if we don't read his word, his love letter to us.

#### Verses 23-24 say,

Some went down to the sea in ships, doing business on the great waters; they saw the deeds of the Lord, his wondrous works in the deep.

This section goes on to describe how their courage melts by the

rough waves. This happens to us when we try to handle life on our own without placing our faith in the Lord. Without God in our lives, every challenge we face is insurmountable; every problem a crisis, empty of hope.

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Why do we insist on living this way? Why are we so stubborn that we will not turn to the Lord for fulfillment, for a relationship of pray, for nourishment through His word or for help with the challenges of life? It is not too late. After every example in Psalm 107, the psalmist says, "And then they cried to the Lord in their trouble, and he delivered them from their distress." God desires all men to be saved, and so he never ignores our cries for mercy. Let us turn to him for comfort and guidance every day. Be persistent, be faithful, be watchful. For God is. And then give thanks to the Lord, for He is good.

**1 Peter 1:18-19** <sup>18</sup> For you know that it was not with perishable things such as silver or gold that you were redeemed from the empty way of life handed down to you from your forefathers, <sup>19</sup> but with the precious blood of Christ, a lamb without blemish or defect.

#### Council in September - In person and online

The verses above combined to anchor the devotion shared at the council meeting with the message of being intentional - in our evangelism, in following Jesus, our crosses in tow. "Intentionality gives clarity and focus" the author, Steve Cohen shared. We are coming into a season of big decisions and, pandemic-*cross* aside, we must be clear and focused. Please *intentionally* pray for wisdom and discernment for our church body, our council and our call committee.

Council reached consensus on: 1) Pursuing a safe deposit box for our important papers which will in turn require a policy around access which task the Finance Committee will undertake; 2) Welcoming a Wycliffe bible translator to present their mission. (Our congregation *intentionally* supports Lutheran Bible Translators as one of our missions)

We are no longer searching for a **Council Secretary!** Council passed the motion to appoint **Linda Kuhn** to the position beginning in November. She will complete the term ending June 2021 when the position is up for official election. Please thank Linda for her service and pray for her in this new role.

Council will begin work on the **2021 budget** which will be presented to the congregation at the November regular voter meeting. We fully expect that the salary of a new pastor will be equal to or exceed what we had previously paid. That results in a pretty consistent need of \$20k a month in giving. We currently lag behind that expectation in our revenue plan. While the stewardship board will conduct a fall campaign focused on anticipated needs for moving a pastor and for the building fund, we need, as a church body, to elevate our level of giving to what it was at the beginning of the year, pre-COVID and pre-vacancy. Please pray for wisdom and fearless faith in this matter.


# Women's Bible Breakfast • Saturday • October 10

#### The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod LCMS Stewardship Ministry – October 2020

We celebrate the Reformation at the end of each October. The Reformation began on All Saints' Eve in 1517, which was when Martin Luther posted the 95 Theses to the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. So, let's hear from Luther himself on the topic of giving and stewardship.

In the Small Catechism under the Table of Duties, Martin Luther gives specific Bible passages to help Christians know their duty in their various vocations as members of their family, society at large, and in God's family, the Church. Under the heading "What Hearers Owe Their Pastors," Luther lists five passages from the Bible, three of which have to do with giving to your local congregation. They are these:

- "The Lord has commanded that those who preach the gospel should receive their living from the gospel." (1 Cor. 9:14)
- •
- "Anyone who receives instruction in the word must share all good things with his instructor. Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows." (Gal. 6:6–7)
- •
- "The elders [presbyters, i.e., pastors] who direct the affairs of the church well are worthy of double honor, especially whose work is preaching and teaching. For the Scripture says, 'Do not muzzle the ox while it is treading out the grain,' and 'The worker deserves his wages.' " (1 Tim. 5:17–18)

Luther comments on these passages in his 1535 Lectures on Galatians. He wrote:

"When Paul says 'all good things,' this is not to be taken to mean that everyone should share all his possessions with his preacher. No, it means that he should provide for him liberally, giving him as much as is needed to support his life in comfort. ... The apostle is so serious in advocating this topic of support for preachers that he adds a threat to his denunciation and exhortation, saying: 'God is not mocked.' ... All this pertains to the topic of support for ministers. I do not like to interpret such passages; for they seem to commend us, as in fact they do. In addition, it gives the appearance of greed if one emphasizes these things diligently to one's hearers. Nevertheless, people should be taught also about this matter, in order that they may know that they owe both respect and support to their preachers. Christ teaches the same thing in Luke 10:7: 'Eating and drinking what they provide, for the laborer deserves his wages'; and Paul says elsewhere (1 Cor. 9:13–14): 'Do you not know that those who are employed in the temple service get their food from the temple, and those who serve at the altar share in the sacrificial offerings? In the same way the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the Gospel should get their living by the Gospel.' It is important for us who are in the ministry to know this, so that we do not have a bad conscience about accepting for our work wages ... it happens when those who proclaim the glory of God and faithfully instruct the youth derive their livelihood from them. It is impossible that one man should be devoted to household duties day and night for his support and at the same time pay attention to the study of Sacred Scripture, as the teaching ministry requires. Since God has commanded and instituted this, we should know that we may with a good conscience enjoy what is provided for the comfortable support of our lives from church properties to enable us to devote ourselves to our office." (LW 27:125-126)
