

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Martin Luther

As many of you know, 2022 marks the 500th anniversary of Dr. Martin Luther's translation of the Greek New Testament into

the language of his German parishioners. While reading about this historic achievement, I came across a comment by Luther about how his translation of the New Testament had changed the world in a way I had never thought about. He Writes.

"First if I, Dr. Luther, could have expected that all the papists taken together would be capable enough to translate a single chapter of the Scriptures correctly and well, I should certainly have mustered up enough humility to invite their aid and assistance in putting the New Testament into German. But because I knew—and still see with my own eyes—that none of them knows how to translate, or to speak German, I spared them and myself that trouble. It is evident, indeed, that from my German translation they are learning to speak and write German, and so are stealing from me my language, of which they had little knowledge before.

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...It tickles me that I have taught my ungrateful pupils, even my enemies, how to speak." (Luther's Works 35:182-183)

I remember one of my seminary professors telling us that Luther did for the German language what Shakespeare would later do for his English speaking countrymen, he standardize the German language for generations to come. It never occurred to me that as people were reading, or attempting to read, their new German bible they were learning the basics as well i.e. grammar, vocabulary, spelling, sentence structure, even pronunciation.

In light of this phenomenal achievement, I thought that I would recount to you a number of other interesting facts that you may or may not have known about the man who truly changed the course of history.

There were various spelling of Luther's family name, Chlotar, Luder, Ludher, and Lueder. Martin Luder eventually changed the spelling of his last name to "Luther" when he was at the University of Erfurt. This was academically a more respectable spelling.

- ❖ In 1492, Luther was in grammar school when Christopher Columbus sailed the ocean blue, and Michelangelo was completing his work on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel when Luther began teaching theology.
- ❖ In 1507, when Martin Luther became a priest and celebrated his first Mass, he trembled so much that he nearly dropped the cup. He became so terrified of the presence of Christ in the Sacrament that he tried to run from the altar. How I hope we have such reverence and awareness of Christ's real presence that we would not be so casual with the Holy Supper, but come to His table in repentance and faith.
- Luther was the first person to translate the New Testament into German directly from Greek, previous German Bibles were based on the Latin Vulgate. Unlike these previous translations, Luther's was idiomatic and readable and largely determined the form of speech that future German literature would take. To this day, Luther's translation of the Bible is the standard translation in use among German speaking people.
- Luther translated the entire New Testament from the Greek into German in 11 weeks, which averages out to more than 1,500 words per day.
- Luther brought congregational singing back into the Church and brought it back in the people's common language (German). Before then singing was confined to the clergy and the language of the Roman Church, Latin.
- Luther is credited with having written 36 hymns, which is quite an achievement as any church musician who has written a hymn will tell you.
- Luther's reforms in music and liturgy encouraged the publication of over 47 Lutheran Hymnals before his death in 1546, and earned the Lutheran church the title "The Singing Church."
- ❖ Ein feste Burg ist unser Gott" or "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" which is a poetic paraphrase of Psalm 46, is considered the battle hymn of the Reformation.
- ❖ Bowling at pins is believed to have originated in ancient Germany. By the 1300's, anywhere from 3 to 17 could be the number of pins one had to knock down depending on which German providence one was living. Luther is credited with establishing nine as the ideal number of pins for the game of bowling. A 16th century biographer of Luther reported that Luther built a bowling lane for his children and was a frequent player himself.
- Luther's writing fill over 70 volumes in English (The American Edition). This is only a portion of the volumes he wrote in German, which is estimated to be over 60,000 pages. Luther had written more than any author before or during his lifetime.
- ❖ Luther was born November 10th 1483 in Eisleben, Germany. He returned to his hometown in 1546 to mediate a family quarrel. The quarrel was settled on February 17th, but that evening Luther experienced sharp pains in the chest, the following morning Luther died in the same town he was born. February 18 is the day the Lutheran Church commemorates the life of Martin Luther, Doctor and Confessor. **Pastor Poynter**

If one focuses on the news these days, one might be tempted to give in to despair what with the wars, threats of war, floods, drought, hurricanes, political dysfunction and violence that abounds. Add to that the rising pressure of inflation impacting our families and we might wonder what there is to be thankful for.

In chapter 16 of 1 Chronicles, David was successful on his second attempt to restore the Ark of the Covenant to the tent he had pitched for it. There was much singing, dancing and instrumental accompaniment with thanksgiving as the Ark made its way to its new home. His song of thanksgiving is what we also know as Psalm 96. David had just been made king in chapter 11, was enjoying good press and success on the battle field. Good times.

For long ago, in the days of David and Asaph, there had been directors for the musicians and for the songs of praise and thanksgiving to God. Nehemiah 12:46 (NIV)

Nehemiah and company were celebrating the completion of the reconstruction of the wall around Jerusalem. It had been a tough go, what with all the the naysayers and attempts to thwart the progress. Council Actions: There was not a quorum at the October meeting, so no voted decisions were made. Work continued on the budget. Some specific budget challenges to consider follow.

- Our undesignated cash on-hand in the main checking account has been declining as giving has slowed. We started January with \$60,000+ and as of the end of September are at \$40,000. If nothing changes, we will run cash short by this time next year.
- If we end the fourth quarter of 2022 as we did in 2021 with regard to income, we will fall below the 2022 income budget and even below 2021 actual income by \$15,000.
- Fixed expenses (utilities, snow removal, etc.) are expected to rise in 2023 impacted by inflation (if not weather).
- We do not yet know whether or by how much the annual mortgage rate may rise. Our renewal is in February with notification in January.

In addition, the Property board has proposed a comprehensive list of non-budget projects ranging from necessary maintenance to enhancements that will improve some current challenging conditions. The bottom line in cost exceeds prior estimates presented to the congregation. We will need to make decisions on priorities or get creative on how we can address these needs.

Please plan on attending the **November 20** congregation meeting at which time we will, with thanksgiving and perseverance, discuss and decide on what our faith-filled budget will look like.


